Loyola school bags IT quiz

KOCHI: A team comprising Karthik Prakash Nair and Advaith Shankar J, Std. X students of Loyola School, Thiruvananthapuram won the State-level TCS IT Wiz contest organised here on Friday by Tata Consultancy Services.

The team would represent Kerala at the national round. All the other teams were represented by students from Stds XI and XII. The Loyola team had a neck-and-neck race with Bhavans Adarsha Vidyalaya, Kakkanad, Kochi, each winning 55 points, till the duo from Bhavans lost 10 points in the last round. The runners-up team consisted of Athul Chacko Philip and Ravikrishnan R. The St. Anto-School. Kottayam ny's represented by Allen Jose and Vishnu Sharma were the second runners-up, having won 20 points.

The Flag Officer Commanding in Chief of the Southern Naval Command Vice Admiral K. N. Sushil was the chief guest. The winners walked away with an amazing range of prizes which were distributed by the chief guest along with Santhosh Kurup, centre head of TCS Kochi.

Around 600 teams from 110 schools in the State vied to make it to the list of six teams which were shortlisted for the finals. The questions
